- 4. Carvaka/Lokayata: its epistemology, metaphysics and ethics.

- 6. Buddhism: the four noble truths, theory of dependent origination, doctrine of flux, theory of no-soul, nirvana.

- 8. Plato: Theory of Knowledge, Theory of Ideas
- 9. Aristotle: Critique of Plato's Theory of Forms, Causation, Matter and Form

- 11. Rationalism: Descartes (method, cogito, substance and God), Spinoza (substance, attributes and modes), Leibniz (substance and monadology). Mind-body problem.

- 2. Samkhya: Causation. Prakrti, its constituents, evolutes and arguments for its existence. Purusa, arguments for existence and plurality of purusa. Relationship between prakrti and purusa. Kaivalya

Unit II

- 3. Advaita: sat, atman, brahman, maya, vivartavada, jiva, jiva-brahman relation, moksa
- 4. Visistadvaita: Saguna brahman, refutation of maya,parinamavada, aprthaksiddhi, jiva, bhakti and prapatti, moksa

Unit III

5. Empiricism: Locke (refutation of innate ideas, theory of ideas: types of ideas, nature and limits of knowledge), Berkeley (refutation of abstract ideas and matter, idealism), Hume (ideas and impressions, refutation of causality and self, scepticism)

6. Kant: idea of criticism, possibility of synthetic apriorijudgments, agnosticism
